Utah's First Known Quidditch Player:

"Did you know Quidditch was a real sport?" For years, the rumors and stories spread across the country of a new college coed full contact sport involving elements of different games all done atop a broom. Harry Potter Fans would experiment with the idea here and there, and a game may even be put together to celebrate a book or movie release. Yet for the state of Utah, the prospect of organized teams and practices was only an idea.

It was only an idea, that is, until Timothy Riser of Brigham Young University and others like him decided to take the first step into organizing an official team under the International Quidditch Association.

This month, the UQO would like to honor Tim, and his pioneering efforts in helping to promote the sport like no other, in our new "Player of the Month" column. Printed in this issue is our exclusive interview.

US: How did you first hear about Muggle Quidditch?

Tim: "I just heard about college tournaments happening on the East Coast, and my friend and I like to do crazy things. It was something you could really get into, but it is more than something crazy – it is a real sport to play and have a lot of fun doing."

US: In the time you had a BYU team going, what was the best part of the whole experience?

Tim: "The best part was that it was so unlike other sports, but it still keeps the spirit of full contact sports, and I love it."

US: What was your first practice and game like?

Tim: "We probably went through about a dozen brooms because we all brought mettle brooms which kept snapping, and it was very icey with a few injuries, but we all had a blast."

BYU's first team of Quidditch players was organized at least a year before the UQO. It wasn't an official school club, but when Tim heard about all the new teams starting across the state, he was sure that there is still plenty of interest in Provo to start a new official team.

Tim will be out of the Quidditch scene for two years, as he will be serving a two year mission in South Korea. "I'll see you guys later," Tim said. "Best of luck with Quidditch while I'm gone!"

2005 marked the beginning of Muggle Quidditch in Middlebury College in Vermont. A few years later, groups of friends at Brigham Young University, Southern Utah University, and also Westminster College started the first Utah teams. However, with the sport itself almost entirely unknown to the college crowd, these teams fizzled out after time.

In February of 2010, Nicholas Burk came across video promotions of Quidditch online from his home in Salt Lake. That day, he sent a message to Alex Benepe, Commissioner of the IQA (then, Intercollegiate Quidditch Association) asking about which teams were close by.

The answer came that no active teams were in the state at that time, but Alex sent a rule book all the same. Nicholas studied it and put the concepts into practice, playing with his nephew in the back yard. The fun of the game caught not only his, but his friend's attention, and they soon formed a team originally dubbed "The Utah Heroes." The name was later changed to the "Utah Hex" and the new community team practiced every other week at a nearby park, where the players would teach local kids how to play.

A variety of playing styles and rules were explored, including holding the broom out to a player's side and each player having a snitch tucked in their shorts. However, the team soon found out that the IQA rules were simply the best way to go.

Playing atop dollar store brooms (padded to prevent injury), the Hex honed their skills, however they were not satisfied with playing scrimmages, but were eager to play against other teams. In order to get the word out about their team, as well as help find others and form a network or association, to help organize matches and tournaments, something needed to be established.

On Feb 26th, the Utah Quidditch Organization was formed; however other names such as SLIQ (Salt Lake Intramural Quidditch) were tossed around in the process. On March 1st, utahquidditch.org was set up as an online resource for players within the state.

In only a matter of weeks, the UQO was notified about a new team starting up at Judge Memorial High School. The first official game of the first official Utah Cup was soon arranged between the two teams at Sugar House Park on July 31st (Harry Potter's Birthday) 2010. Soon, other teams were able to find the UQO and more learned about Quidditch through the UQO's presence at fairs and community service.

The rest, as they say, is history. There are now 14 teams within the state with others rumored to be starting up at Weber State and Park City High school! Quidditch games have been covered on every major news network in the state. The UQO is now winding up its second interscholastic state-wide championship, and players from Utah are gearing up for their first out-ofstate games!
