

Cup Champions, Snow Utah's own Crimson Fliers now have the distinction and the great challenge to represent our proud state's Quidditch talent, heading to the sunny beaches of the West Cup Regional Tournament!

The University of Utah Student players will play in the International Quidditch Association's Western Cup in Los Angeles California on April 2nd and 3rd. These games will represent the largest Quidditch tournament of all history west of the Mississippi! They will be playing broom to broom against World Class teams such as: Arizona State University, Emerson College, Moorpark College, Occidental College (Known for being the first school to offer a Quidditch Scholarship), San Jose State University, The Silicon Valley Skrewts, UC Berkeley, UCLA, and USC! The games will take place at Cheviot Hills Park, with a performance from "The Remus Lupins" Saturday night.



Head Team Training Coach, Matthew Williams has a rigorous training program set up in the short weeks until the tournament, with strategies and plays kept confidential from the media. In addition to running drills and creating plays, the Fliers will also be holding a few fundraisers (including a bake sale) to help them make the long, long trip.

Youngster Tourney



Are you between 6 and 12? Do you want to play Quidditch without waiting until High School or College? Then your patience has paid off. The UQO is proud to announce our first ever Youngster Tourney!

Boys and girls Elementary school age all across the state are invited to come and play Quidditch at South Ridge Park in Taylorsville on Saturday, April 23rd. High School and College age Quidditch players are asked to invite their younger siblings, nieces and nephews, and everyone else who can make it.

Youngsters will be sorted into two teams via a sorting hat, and will play a couple of games before being resorted creating entirely new teams for the last games, each estimated to last about 15 minutes.

The IQA rules regarding physical contact will be modified to ensure safety, and additional referees will be appointed to promote fair play. Don't forget to tell youngsters you know, and we'll see you there!

Wizard Duel: How To Play



After the awarding of the Snow Cup, players from Utah and Arizona drew their wands and sent spells and curses at each other like only Quidditch players could do. The game was "Spellcasting," as seen at the University of Utah ball room at Harry Potter Alliance parties.

The game was conceived by Hex players Nicholas Burk and Steven Burk, at about the same time they started playing Quidditch as kids.

For the first time ever, the rules are now set for everyone to play. This will be your first lesson, young Witch or Wizard. Pay careful attention, and enjoy!

Game: "Spellcasting" "Wizard Duel"

Objective: Avoid being hit by spells and be the last wizard or witch standing by collecting everyone else's wands.

Game Play: All spells are heaped in a pile in the middle of a room or field. Each player chooses one or two spells. All players begin by standing back to back and taking 7 steps away from each other. Once they turn around, the game is on. Players cast spells, hitting them against other players who must follow certain rules when hit. When wands are dropped, they can be picked up by others who are quick enough to snatch them. The wizard or witch who collects all the wands wins.

Materials Needed:

- 1. Wands: Each player will need to bring a wand (sturdy, without a sharp tip, and preferably made of wood). These may also be provided in adequate number, so all players may start with one, and only one.
- 2. Spells: These are made from foam ½ page sheets, brightly colored and wrapped with bright tape (reflective is preferred) in conical shape, with weights fastened in their tips. (This can be made by taping marbles in the top center of the sheet, then wrapping the sheet so the weight remains in the tip.) Narrow cones tend to work better.
- 3. <u>Marker</u>: Each spell is made of a unique color, and specified by the name of the spell (along with the rule the one hit must follow) in marker. These are all written on the spells.

Spells:

- Expelliarmus Red; drop your wand, and you cannot pick it up again before you count to 10 out loud.
- <u>Stupefy</u> Orange; drop your wand, and you cannot pick it up again until after your back has touched the ground.
- Accio Yellow; You must throw your wand or a nearby spell to the one who hit you, depending on what they demand.
- <u>Locomotor Mortis</u> Green; Your legs are locked until you count to

- 10 out loud, however you may still pick up spells or wands within reach, but you cannot walk or run.
- Petrificus Totalus Blue; You must freeze completely until you are finished counting out loud to 10. You may also grip your wand tight, yet if it is pulled from your grip, that is a legal move.
- <u>Protego</u> Purple; While this spell is in the air, and before it hits the ground, the one who sent it upward is immune to any spells hitting them.
- <u>Finite Incantatem</u> White; (Team play only) When you are hit by a team member, you are freed from any spell which just hit you.
- Wild Card Brown; The spell caster may use this cone for any spell, given they specify and cast the spell correctly.

How to Cast a Spell:

In order to correctly send a spell into an opponent, the witch or wizard must mount it on their wand, and flick it off their wand while shouting the name of the spell. The spell must hit an opponent before it takes affect. Spells may be deflected by a player's wand. Happy dueling!



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("Report" Continued...)

Prior to the games on March 5th, The Hex and Crimson Fliers played each other twice, allowing each team to come to the finals with scores of 360 (Fliers) and 230 (Hex).

At around 11:30 Pm on the 4th, players from Flagstaff Arizona began meeting at a rendezvous point in Taylorsville. They were then able to stay at the homes of Hex and Fliers Players before and after the tournament. Following a breakfast of champions, the teams began to assemble near the mid fields of Liberty Park, near Tracey Aviary's Owl Exhibit.

Last minute rule reviews. stretching and a coin toss led to the first match at 12:00 between the Narwhals and





the Hex. The fast pace and hard play set the tone of the final games in the crisp winter air.

The Narwhals impressed the assembling crowds with their level of skill at being such a new team, and certainly brought a competitive game aboard their prototype brooms christened "Storm Strikers."

The Hex were able to move the Quaffle well, yet the strongly offensive strategy from NAU's Beaters kept the competition cut down. The snitch was caught in under 15 minutes by NAU's captain, leading to a second match to commence right after. (This was the case in all games with the exception of the second Hex game, which ended at just over 15 minutes.) The Narwhals achieved their first victory, 110 to 80. This thrilling match was covered by local Channel 2 News, and was complimented with free hot chocolate.



1:30 found NAU head to head against the Winter Cup's leading team, the Crimson Fliers. The grueling match was punctuated with many Quaffle steals by the Fliers and drives made from their hoops down to lightning-speed scores at

the NAU end. However formidable NAU's Keeper, the Fliers' Chasers talent showed as they passed and scored like clockwork. The second double game also the introduced crowd to Snitchly Mischief. Roland Jordan led Seekers on a challenging chase finding him up on top of a trellis near the pitch. He wasn't caught until after jumping down and darting towards the pitch, at which time he was caught by the Flier's Seeker. The double match added 90, then 80 points to the Flier's score. NAU scored 50 points in the second game.



Taco Bell was the lunch of choice for many Hex and NAU players, who later visited the London Market near historic Trolly Square. There, players found wands, candies, and British souvenirs at a surprise tournament player discount!

The Fliers' new scoreboard reflected the previous match's points. The Fliers lead with 530 points, Hex: 310, and NAU followed with 160 points, leading to a second half of new strategies never before seen in Salt Lake!



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At 4:00 Whistles blew and brooms soared with the crash of NAU and the Utah Hex. While the first games showed few tackles, Players soon found themselves shoved and stuffed on both sides.

With Fliers commentating, a few players gained new nicknames, including NAU's Eric Andres' "Bear Train" (notorious for his strength and stature, plowing through the opposition, and breaking through to the other team's hoops), and the Hex's Nicholas Burk, dubbed "Mail-Man" (for running the Quaffle and delivering it at the end of the pitch each time he caught it).

NAU's Beaters fought like champions to ensure their rematch with the Hex would be one to remember. One new technique was to trail the Hex's Seeker, with their Beaters, who knocked him out an estimated 12 times during play. NAU's Keepers also stepped up



their game blocking nearly 80% of the Hex's shots.

Hex and NAU Chasers tied, 60 to 60 when Snitch Runner Roland Jordan broke into the match. Just as he attempted to pick up the Hex's Seeker (Aaron McColley) and steal his broom, the snatch was made across the Snitch's back, ending the match: 90 to 60!



The Snitch Runner of the second to last game lead Seekers across the park. crowds, literally through hoops, and up gigantic fir trees, making that the longest match of the Snow Cup. NAU's beaters continued their attack, and Chasers tried even more bold shots, some from their own side of the field. Although their powerful charge continued into their sixth game of the day, the unparalleled talent and practice of the Crimson Fliers came

The last match was filled with pure Quidditch Magic, with star Crimson Chasers Kevin Engberson, Matt Williams, George Williams and others shooting down the field time and time again, passing, catching, and sending the Quaffle packing.

Cheers not only followed the Flier's chasers, but also erupted each time their Keepers blocked, making them the Keepers most successful tournament. Adding their experienced Beaters to the mix ensured the Fliers a hearty victory.

The Snitch Runner of the last match stayed mostly within the pitch boundaries, weaving the Seekers in and out of game play (leaving them prone to Beater attack). Although the Narwhals'

Seeker won out in the previous match, the Fliers took away the last snatch, leaving NAU with 40 then 20 points, and the Crimson Fliers with 60 and 110 points!



For diehard fans and spectators alike. the exhilarating conclusion of the Snow Cup lived up to the thrill only Quidditch Pitch goes know. The final scores were tallied, Fliers: 700, Hex: 400, and NAU: 280!

With words from each of the team captains, and from the UQO President and Referee, the Fliers were awarded the 2011 Utah Quidditch Snow trophy, with its title "internationalquidditch.org" inscribed in its base.



The amazing action and game play will be hard to forget, but it was the uncanny sportsmanship and goodwill amongst players that will never be forgotten. After the dueling and goodbyes that followed the games, the new reigning champions invited NAU to dinner at "The Pie" Pizzaria, a favorite University of Utah student spot.

This is Quidditch, in its finest form, and it isn't hard to imagine, that out of all the blundering, stuffing and snatching, that everyone came away more grateful for the game.
